- 4 All vegetables must be home grown in Pope County. They must be clean, blemish free, and consistent in size and color. All entries that fail to meet these requirements will be disqualified.
- 5 No Wild Crops. (e.g. hickory nuts, black walnuts, persimmons, grapes.)
- 6 **Absolutely NO COTTON**
